In the Classroom

AGC Georgia member Nix-Fowler Constructors, Inc. is a partner in CTAE training. They are providing students with real-world opportunities to gain the necessary skills required in the commercial construction industry. Recently, Nix-Fowler purchased supplies and equipment for two carpentry programs, and then arranged for 20+ students to be OSHA trained. Jonesboro High School carpentry pathway students Mario Cardenas, Sergio Salazar, Eddie Sanders, and Cameron Tye are interning with Nix-Fowler during the completion of a renovation project at Arnold Elementary School.

- In May, Statesboro High School held a ribbon cutting ceremony at the completion of their "duck pond project." Students in Matthew White's construction class built the walkway and platform. Matthew is always looking for ways to enhance his students' experience and prepare them for careers and higher education after high school. AGC Georgia offers our congratulations to Matthew for being named Statesboro High School's Teacher of the Year.
- In May, Fred Hill with The Sack Company spoke to Home Builders Institute (HBI) graduates about careers in construction. HBI's mission is to advance and provide education, career development, training and placement of men and women serving the building industry.

In 2017, construction teacher Jim Steel became an OSHA authorized Outreach Trainer so he could offer OSHA training to his students. In May, students at Crisp County High School's second level class received their OSHA 10-Hour cards. The group proudly showed them off at their celebration.

This past spring representatives from Collins and Arnold volunteered with many workforce development initiatives. Matt Hardy, project manager, and John Arnold, vice president, are part of an industry

team certifying the welding program at Maxwell High School. Jenny Horton, the firm's president, spent time at the school conducting mock interviews with students and attending the spring advisory board meeting. Josh Tupa, a company superintendent, volunteered with the Vickery Mill Elementary Construction Club in Roswell. Tim Fulmer,

the director of preconstruction, is leading an evaluation team to certify the construction program at Chestatee High School.

In 2016, AGC Georgia and local contractor members were instrumental in the planning and development of an eight-month customized Supervisory Training Program (STP) at Oconee Fall Line Technical College in Dublin. This initiative is helping address the need for construction supervisors. The program uses the STP curriculum developed by AGC of America.

This past spring, OFTC hosted their second annual graduation, honoring students completing all STP units and meeting certain benchmark criteria. Nine students were honored as full program graduates and 23 others were

recognized as unit completers in a ceremony. "I am so proud of this program and I'm proud of the folks in it," said Charlie Garbutt, CEO of Garbutt Construction, while addressing the graduates. "You're the reason it's a success and my hat's off to you."

During the June 2018 AGC Georgia Annual Convention, Jenny Horton, president of Collins and Arnold Construction Company was honored with our association's Volunteer of the Year award. Jenny has a true passion for workforce development and has been engaged with our efforts since AGC Georgia



began dedicating resources to shaping the future of our industry's skilled pipeline.

One of the most admirable aspects of her leadership style is that she empowers all of her employees from management to field leadership to get engaged. Her project managers and superintendents are encouraged to speak to construction classes. They have standing permission to host students for field trips on the company's sites. She's implemented a per diem to encourage superintendents to help during lessons at nearby high schools.

Camp Trade & Industry

Beginning on June 6, 2018, more than 30 construction teachers from around the state gathered at the Golden Isles College and Career Academy in Brunswick, GA for Camp Trade & Industry (T & I). Over the course of three days, the instructors attended classes focusing on best practices and how to use more technology in the classroom. They also participated in lab projects using metal studs and concrete forming. After a low country boil on Thursday evening, instructors were placed in teams on Friday and competed in masonry, tile, electrical, plumbing, and carpentry projects. This comprehensive training is very unique and vital to the growth of Georgia's construction programs. Construction teachers are the equivalent to "farm team coaches." They are the knowledgeable leaders who help develop student interest in construction and open many doors for those who show a natural aptitude for the skilled trades.

During the spring, AGC Georgia reached out to members asking them to support our "Adopt Your Instructor" campaign with a \$250 donation to the AGC Georgia Foundation. The goal was to have contractors from around the state connect with a local construction teacher and offer to offset their travel and lodging cost so they could participate in the continuing education opportunity.

Member firms provided over \$9000 in contributions and were used to not only help offset teacher cost, but also help pay for various meals and material needs involved with hosting the camp.

Statewide Initiatives

In April, representatives from Batson-Cook Company, Ben B. Gordy Construction, Brasfield & Gorrie, and River City Contracting, along with other industry professionals and AGC Georgia staff met with the Harris County CTAE Director and Work Based Learning Coordinator to provide support to the district as they plan to reopen the construction program at Harris County High School.



A meeting was held in middle Georgia with representatives from Oconee Fall Line Technical College, state representatives, Heart of Georgia College & Career Academy and others to work with OFTC officials to create a construction/CM program possibly in concert with Georgia Southern University. The group also discussed the importance of creating elementary school construction clubs and applying for grants with DOE to fund middle school construction programs.



In May, Charlie Garbutt held a meeting at the Heart of Georgia College & Career Academy to promote middle school construction programs and construction-related programs at OFTC. It was a powerhouse meeting that included Senator Larry Walker and House member Matt Hatcher. AGC Georgia Board members, Scott Clark and Joe Tuggle, shared successes tied to the AGC Georgia Workforce Development Alliances they each serve

on. Other speakers included Zach Fields, CEFGA, and Dean Cutler and Jeff Johnson, Laurens County construction instructors. By meeting's end, there were commitments to work towards the desired curriculum for the college and the middle school programs and both legislators were on board



to push forward on the capital outlay needed for OFTC to renovate space for a construction lab.

Last year AGC Georgia, CEFGA, and local industry met with Chris Hatcher, CEO of Commodore College & Career Academy. The meeting resulted in a decision to include construction as a pathway. On May 10, 2018, Zach Fields, K-12 Pipeline Director with CEFGA, Landon Dooley of A. West Enterprise, Steve Barrett with MetroPower, and

AGC Georgia staff met again with Hatcher to discuss the construction pathway status and show industry's continued support. After an overview, Hatcher took the group on a tour and introduced the group to several instructors and construction students who are operating in a makeshift lab until a new building is constructed that will house construction and welding.


It's Skills Challenge Time Again!
