Skills Challenge Builds on its Success to Attract Future Workforce

Planning groups making a difference at the five regional events

t's no surprise to AGC Georgia members that it takes diligent planning, hard work and a team effort to make any project a success. Well, it's no different when organizing five Workforce Development Alliance Skills Challenges across the state during a four-week period.

Members of our Alliances coordinate hundreds of volunteers, as well as the planning and execution of the regional events recently held in Augusta, Cedartown, Gainesville, Macon and Moultrie along with on-site judges at each competition.



The Skills Challenge events continue to grow exponentially each year with a record number of schools and participants, as well as increased sponsorship support from the industry. "The connections we're making with these students at the Skills Challenges will positively impact our industry for years to come," said Mike Dunham, CEO of AGC Georgia. "None of this would be possible without the undeniable support and year-round effort our volunteers put into making these events happen."

RA-LIN Teaches HS Construction Class

Since August 2019, leaders at RA-LIN have partnered with Carrollton City Schools to provide students a hands-on learning experience in construction. Ten students (juniors and seniors) were selected to be part of the inaugural program. They meet each school day from 8:30am – noon at the RA-LIN corporate headquarters. The program's goal is to introduce students to a variety of trades and spark their interest in construction careers.

"The students know very little on the first day of the semester," said Chris Stone of RA-LIN. "We have an opportunity to teach them for about 15 hours a week with the proper equipment and guidance needed to help them succeed in this industry."

Throughout their first semester, students have applied their knowledge by participating in a Habitat for Humanity home build. Several students also competed in the Northwest Georgia Skills Challenges to gain more first-hand experience.

"This is not a shop class," said Stone. "Everything builds on the next activity. A school bus brings the students daily to RA-LIN. And, if we need to go where the action is, they get us to a worksite. We are not teaching out of a book, rather we are sharing the knowledge we seek when we hire."

The class can be a stepping-stone between high school and a career in construction. Students become comfortable with the worksite culture, industry vocabulary and

benefit from the expertise of industry veterans. Along with the invaluable hands-on training they receive, the students are also mentored in various ways to continue their construction-related education after high school.

"It could be considered a nine-month long interview," said Stone. "Some seniors will receive full-time employment and some juniors may be offered summer internships. Without hesitation, I believe this program is making a big difference for us and the students."



ACE Electric: Expanding the Pipeline

Recruiting future electricians at the high school level is a critical factor in sustaining the workforce demand. ACE Electric has made an ongoing commitment to offer work-based learning, job shadowing and summer internships for Lowndes High School students who are interested in pursuing a career in commercial electrical construction.

ACE also works closely with several of the Skills Challenge events hosted across the state by AGC Georgia. The firm has developed a program for Wiregrass Georgia Technical College and Ogeechee Technical College. ACE Technologies, a division of the company, has a low voltage program at Central Georgia Technical College.

"We are no longer just competing with other electrical contractors for employees," says Nichole Shanks, Workforce Development Manager with ACE Electric. "With the number of jobs far exceeding the number of available workers, we are competing with every industry." According to Shanks, for every three workers that leave a skilled trade position, only one new employee is hired.

During their first year working with Lowndes High School, nine students were selected to participate in ACE Electric's summer internship program. "We believe the summer internships are a great way to kick off the new program and partner with Lowndes High School and Wiregrass Georgia Technical College," says Shanks.

Jason VanNus, a system coordinator for work-based learning and the youth apprenticeship program at Lowndes High School, says the summer internship with ACE Electric served as a vetting process to see if students wanted to pursue a registered apprenticeship in electrical construction.



He was pleased with the summer internship results, as all nine students continue to work at ACE Electric, with six enrolled as registered apprentices, and seven as dual enrollment students through Wiregrass Georgia Tech. Including high school apprentices, ACE Electric has 10 registered apprentices.

Henry County Academy for Advanced Studies



to long ago, Doug Lee, an instructor from Henry County Academy for Advanced Studies learned his construction class budget was being cut. With a desire to keep his class going, Lee reached out to Joe Tuggle, president of Swofford Construction, and asked if he could help him secure needed materials for his classroom. Tuggle turned to the Central Georgia Workforce Alliance fund within the AGC Georgia Foundation and purchased \$2,200 worth of supplies for the classroom

These funds are made possible by the tremendous support of industry firms that sponsor the annual Central Georgia/Southern Crescent Skills Challenge. All proceeds remaining after the annual event's expenses are paid are available to support regional construction classrooms.

Additionally, Swofford Construction donated steel from one of their jobsites in Stockbridge to the Academy to help their welding students with lab projects.

RW Allen Hosts Jobsite Tour for Students

Lincoln County High School (a member of the East Georgia Workforce Development Alliance) toured RW Allen's Presbyterian Village jobsite in September. Students enrolled in LCHS's construction program and three instructors participated in the visit.

During the site tour, RW Allen superintendents taught the students about plumbing and electrical. The welders in the group were able to watch the mechanical mezzanine in the Village Center being erected. Student carpenters learned more about commercial wood framing in the building.

The RW Allen crew appreciated the opportunity to bring the classroom to life for the students.
