Skills Challenge Back & Bigger in 2021

With seven Challenges –Marietta and Statesboro's events are new this year–we are looking to surpass participation from the last series we offered in 2019 that included 700+ students representing 81 high schools.

Several core competitions offered this year include blueprint reading, cabinet making, carpentry, electrical, HVAC, plumbing, masonry, roofing, TeamWorks, and welding. Attendees beyond the students include state legislators, school superintendents, high school counselors, mayors, school board members, and leaders from the DOE and TCSG.

MAGIC is a free, one-week day camp that introduces high school girls to careers in construction. The camp offers girls a nurturing and supportive





environment to explore and develop basic skills in carpentry, electrical, welding, and other industry-related trade skills.

The Central Georgia MAGIC camp took place June 7-11 at the W.S. Hutchings College and Career Academy in Macon.

MetroPower has been a long-time supporter of MAGIC. Several of its Women's Employee Resource Group members participated in the event. The students learned basic circuitry, apprenticeship programs, and career various opportunities.

Jim Steel Wins Workforce Award

arris County High School Construction Teacher Jim Steel was recently named a 2021 Craft Pro Champion by Construction Ready, formally known as CEFGA. Jim rebuilt the school's construction program after a previous instructor's departure resulted in shutting down the curriculum. Created in partnership with Atlanta CareerRise, the Craft Pro Champion



Awards recognize individuals making a difference in the construction-related workforce development arena.

When Steel arrived from Crisp County High School in 2018, he was met with only remnants of the program that had closed five years prior. According to Steel, the school system invested \$8,000-\$10,000. He also applied for grants that generated an additional \$73,000 to equip the program, which included donated equipment and material from local construction businesses.

Now, the program totals 75 students per semester in three skill levels. The program has earned certification from the National Center for Construction Education and Research. Students who complete the program and pass the test are certified to earn better jobs and higher wages ahead of applicants without such credentials.

Congratulations to Jim Steel! AGC Georgia values our partnership with him and appreciates his hard work as a frontline ambassador for our state's construction industry.



The solution for Lattimore was participating in Youth Build, a pre-apprentice program built for students who want to be a part of the construction industry.

Upon graduation, he earned his GED and achieved numerous awards along including a \$5,000 grant towards a vehicle. In addition, Lattimore received a full-time job with benefits with the trade union of his choice. He selected the carpentry union, where he will be a paid apprentice for five years until he receives his journeymen's certification.
